



Author's rights

Sources:

- International treaties
- National Law
 - Swiss Copyright Act

Conditions for protection:

Work with an individual character

Protection:

- Exclusive rights on the exploitation of the work
- Moral rights






From « copyright » to « copyleft »

History

- From the software ...
 - 1989: 1st version of the GPL
 - Idea: to share the code
 - Extension : documentation
- New licenses
 - Art libre ...
- Creative commons
 - Non-profit organization founded in 2001
 - Manage a license portfolio





Public licenses

Principle:

Free dissemination

Main types of licenses:


- Free licenses:
 - 4 freedoms: to use, change, distribute, study*

(* specific to software)

- Open source Licenses:
 - 10 criteria, including the right of distribution, the right of creating derivate, etc.
- Ad hoc licenses



The clauses in detail

4 clauses...


- Attribution « BY » (i)
 - Right of authorship
- Share alike « SA »
 - Right of reproduction / distribution
- No derivative works « ND » (=)
 - Right to authorize the creation of derivative works
- Non Commercial « NC »

Warning: the contents may vary depending on the version of the license (international / national)

How to use it?

What have I to do to « license »?

- Distribution :
 - Juxtapose the logos to your creation
 - For more clarity:
 - Add an express clause « This work is distributed under CC_BY »
 - Don't forget :
 - To indicate the author's / rights' holder
 - Ex: « Created by Anna Martin, anna.martin@unine.ch, for the University of Neuchâtel, 2017 »
- Use:
 - Comply with the conditions
 - In particular, include the original copyright's notice and the liability clause




Distribution of a work





Creative Commons => not one but different licenses
